Gospeller: The Lord be with you. **People:** And also with you.

Gospeller: In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God. All things came into being through him, and without him not one thing came into being. What has come into being in him was life, and the life was the light of all people. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it.







The Communion: An Act of Spiritual Communion:

'Spiritual Communion' has a long tradition in the Anglican Church, and indeed in the larger Christian tradition. The practice of spiritual communion is found in the office of the Communion of the Sick in our 1962 Book of Common Prayer (p. 584), a rubric retained from the Archbishop Cranmer's first Prayer Book (1549) and subsequent revisions. We believe that this current Covid-19 global pandemic, and the governmental and health restrictions that we are currently experiencing, would certainly constitute a "just impediment" to receiving the sacrament "by mouth". This prayer is to be said by those who can't receive in person, but wish to join, in communion, with those doing so.

People: My Jesus, I believe that You are present in the Most Holy Sacrament. I love You above all things, and I desire to receive You into my soul. Since I cannot at this moment receive You sacramentally, come at least spiritually into my heart. I embrace You as if You were already there and unite myself wholly to You. Cleanse and strengthen me with your grace, Lord Jesus, and never let me be separated from you. May I live in you, and you in me, in this life and in the life to come. Amen.
